What Is an endowment fund?

An endowment fund is a pool of donated money and assets that is invested to generate ongoing income for a nonprofit or institution, while preserving the original principle. It provides long-term financial stability by creating a permanent source of funding.

- An endowment is established with assets and gifts, forming the principle.
- Growth comes from investment income, outright gifts, and legacy gifts entrusted through wills and estates, or life insurance policies.
- Each year, a percentage of the earnings from the fund support outreach and mission, while the principal remains untouched.


Why start an endowment?

An endowment is more than financial planning—it is planting seeds of faith for the future. Annually, as early as 2027, a percentage of the earnings from the fund will support outreach and mission.

- Growth: Small gifts equal big impact over time. Even modest contributions, when invested, can sustain ministry for decades.
- Faith in the unseen future: Giving to the endowment is an act of faith—believing that what we plant today will bless those yet to come.
- Community: Our endowment will provide a lasting foundation for outreach, youth programs, and community care rooted in love and justice.

Epiphany Sunday

On January 4th we'll celebrate Epiphany Sunday, the traditional day in which we remember the Magi who visited the Christ child offering gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. What you may or may not know is that January 4th starts the season of Epiphany in the church year, a season that lasts until Lent begins this year Feb 18th.

The way we use the word epiphany in everyday conversation tends to mean a "lightbulb moment" or an "aha moment." A moment of perhaps sudden realization of some truth. That's what the liturgical season is referring to as well. During the season of epiphany we shed light on who this babe born in a manger grows to be—we realize that God is indeed with us in Jesus the Christ.

But realization only happens when we take the time to pay attention. Pay attention to the ways God is at work in our lives through scripture, prayer, relationships, worship, nature, etc. As we begin a new year, can you recommit to paying attention? Paying attention to God, to truth, to justice, to one another? Paying attention can be a spiritual practice, one that is particularly apt for the season of Epiphany.

And as you pay attention, what epiphany or revelation might this season bring you? I'd love to hear about it!

January 4th: Epiphany Sunday

The latecomers to the nativity scene, the Magi, have arrived! Let's see what their story has to say to us in our lives today. As in past years, you'll have an opportunity to choose a Star Word for the year—a word that you might pray and meditate on to see how God might speak to you through that intentional practice.

January 11th: The Mustard Seed

We'll celebrate the official launch of Christ UMC's Endowment Fund exploring the parable of the mustard seed—how small gifts can bear large fruit. We'll also celebrate baptisms on this Baptism of Our Lord Sunday and receive a new member in this celebratory service!

January 18th: Children's Sabbath

The kids are in charge for this animated service themed around the Fruit of the Spirit! Our preschool, elementary, and middle school kids will lead us in worship, demonstrating the many gifts God has given them. The kids will even have a small gift for you as you depart to remind you of our scripture verse for the day!

January 25th: A Light Shines in the Darkness

We'll read a familiar passage from Isaiah about the light shining in the darkness, but wait... does the darkness have to be a bad thing? We'll break open the light-dark binary that has been problematic in Christian history and explore God's holy darkness through an excellent children's book for all ages and a short reflection.

February: Looking ahead to Black History Month

During Black History Month we'll explore a worship series on African-American Spirituals. Each week we'll pair a scripture reading with a Spiritual and we'll put them in conversation with one another. And of course we'll sing the Spiritual too!

A Story of Freedom, Memory, and Repair

Following the Emancipation Proclamation, formerly enslaved people were promised “40 acres and a mule” as a first step toward rebuilding lives that had been stolen from them. In reality, very few of those promises were ever fulfilled. True reparations for freed slaves were rare, and the injustices of slavery were largely left unaddressed. One powerful reminder of both the long delay of justice and the persistence of hope is Juneteenth—the day in June 1865 when enslaved people in Texas finally learned of their freedom, more than two years after emancipation had been declared. For many Americans, Juneteenth was never taught in school and remained largely unknown until very recently. It became a national holiday only in 2021.

Much of that renewed awareness is due to the tireless work of **Opal Lee**, now known as “The Mother of Juneteenth.” For decades, Ms. Lee walked, marched, and advocated so that this day of Black freedom would be remembered and honored nationwide.

Opal Lee’s life also tells a rare and moving story of repair. In June 1939, when Opal was just 12 years old, her family moved into a new home in Fort Worth, Texas. The very next day, a white mob forced them out, smashing their belongings and burning their home to the ground. The family never returned, and the land passed through several owners over the decades.

Eventually, the property came to belong to **Trinity Habitat for Humanity**—an organization Opal Lee herself had helped to found. Years later, she asked Habitat’s CEO if she could buy back her family’s land at 940 East Annie St., Fort Worth. Instead, Habitat built her a new home and sold her the original family plot to her for just \$10 in 2023.

While such stories are far too rare, Opal Lee’s journey offers a glimpse of what truth, remembrance, and restoration can look like. Her life invites us to reflect on our history, to listen to long-silenced voices, and to consider how faith calls us to pursue justice—not only in words, but in tangible acts of repair.

News and Views - Game night. Name of the game? Church vitality

Rev. Matthew Tate, pastor at Hollywood United Methodist Church in southern Maryland, was approached by a child and his dad, who attended the church's weekly youth group, with a problem. They belonged to a board game group that held weekly meetings to play board games at a local store, but the store was closing. They asked if the church would let them use its space for game night. For Tate, it was a no-brainer to help the group.

"The church building is one of the most underutilized things that a church has to offer, which is just their space," he said. "Many churches have these spaces and they're not using them all the time. In fact, many churches aren't using them near as much as they used to, so it's sitting vacant quite a bit."



A few dozen people each week came to the church, playing a wide variety of games. But the games weren't Monopoly or Yahtzee. Tate said the group would even call the popular game Settlers of Catan a "gateway" game, but even that was "too mainstream for them in a lot of ways."

Tate had remembered a call to action for clergy from the Baltimore-Washington Conference Bishop LaTrelle Easterling: she did not want to go to communities and have the people there be unfamiliar with the Conference's local churches.

The board game group brought together people from different generations for the love of board games. Ages often ranged from early teens to mid-60s, none of whom were members of the congregation. Tate, on many occasions, even joined them.

"There were people concerned that the pastor was going to be there," Tate recalled. "They had not had good experiences with pastors, or just thought that it would be really weird. I was there, not in a collar or anything, and got to know them. It wasn't really like 'You need to go get saved before you can play a game. We just talked.'"

A Lesson in Church Vitality, continued

Church attendance in the United States is on the decline, but research suggests the drop-off has slowed or leveled off altogether. According to a Pew Research Center poll, a little more than six in ten people identify as Christian. Ministry software company Churchtrac finds that, since the turn of the 21st century, weekly church attendance has declined to just 20 percent, down more than 33 percent.

Church vitality could play a role in reversing such trends. While the church is outside of the walls, the physical space churches can provide is still a huge boon for congregations looking to engage with their broader community, Tate explained. By opening up to non-ministry events or groups, if the need ever arises, that familiarity could prove fruitful in the future.

“Should the day ever come when any of them all of a sudden feels the calling of the Spirit to go to a church, this is a church they are somewhat familiar with. They’ve been there,” Tate said.

In a turn of events, the father who asked if the group could hold Friday night game nights at the church became the youth leader at Hollywood UMC. Yet, the fruit of the relationship kept coming.

Around a dozen attendees have at some point attended a Sunday church service. One regular member of the board game group worked at a local bank, helping to secure a \$500 donation for an upcoming mission trip. And when events like the church pancake breakfast arise, the board game group regularly shows up too.

The decision to host the board gamers even drew praise from those who didn’t share Hollywood UMC’s theological beliefs. One attendee, unprompted, wrote a review of the church online.

“This church opened its doors to our local board game group when we lost the place at which we normally play,” the Game Night participant wrote. “I am not religious, but in my humble opinion, this church exemplifies a spirit of Christian generosity.”

Tate hoped that the relationships built over Friday night gameplay, including his favorite, One Word, would lead them to Hollywood UMC if they ever felt a tug to attend church. But it’s also about embracing the unknown. Perhaps, the game night will be the extent of some people’s interaction with the church.

“I don’t know if any of them would say I’m their pastor, but I think that if they were looking for a pastor, it might be whoever is the pastor at Hollywood,” Tate said. “If they were looking for a church, Hollywood might be the place that they go.”

“You plant these seeds and you don’t really know what will happen,” he added.


